Christian Doctrine

Lecturer: Cory Brock: Creation and New Creation: How Grace Restores Everything **Time**: 2.00 pm to 3.15 pm

To understand the power of Christ's cross, one must first see the problem the cross addresses. That problem is both personal and cosmic, that creation is fallen. The apostle John famously says, "For God so loved the world that he sent his only Son." He invites us there to understand Christ's salvation in the light of God's love for the world, for people and for everything else. The apostle's creed reminds us: God almighty is the maker of heaven and earth. Therefore, God loves that which he has made and will not leave it to die. In this course we will explore the doctrines of creation, the fall, and re-creation or how the grace of Christ restores nature. The work of Christ is the work of restoration and so Christ came to be our great physician.

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Essays

Those who wish to qualify for either the *Certificate in Theology* or the *Diploma in Christian Studies* will be required to submit one essay in each department each year. Essay titles will be announced early in the course and students will receive guidance on the art of preparing and submitting written assignments.

Students who obtain Distinctions in at least 4 out of the 6 essays will receive a *Certificate in Theology with Distinction*. Similarly, students who obtain Distinctions in at least 8 out of the 12 essays will receive a *Diploma in Christian Studies with Distinction*.

The due dates for essays are mentioned below. You must submit the essay on time. However, if, for exceptional reasons, you require an extension, please contact the Secretary.

All essays are to be submitted by email or via the Saturday Course website. Essays submitted by email should be sent to Ruth Smith (<u>offices@ets.ac.uk)</u>

Students who wish merely to attend without submitting the essays are, of course, welcome (and pay a much lower fee!). However, essays are more than a means of assessment. They are an important educational tool, stimulating students to think through important issues and to express themselves clearly. Everyone is encouraged to rise to the challenge; and every effort will be made to ensure that essay-marks are confidential.

Food and drink
